Unfortunately, on June 28, 2021, our brother, Ted Gertsakis, did not get to go home. He tragically died on the job site at York University. That was my saddest day since I became a union representative. At this time, I wish to express my deepest condolences to Brother Ted's family, his coworkers and members of Local 1819.

Also on a sad note, Jim Micks, our longstanding business representative for Local 1904—SS Marie/Sudbury/Timmins, has passed away. My condolences to Jim's family and members of Local 1904.

To say that life has been challenging from the start of the COVID 19 pandemic in March 2020, would be an understatement. We are now at the end of the third wave. With declining COVID 19 case numbers and uptake in vaccinations, I hope there will be no fourth wave. I wish to thank all DC 46 members and their families for following public health recommendations—using masks, hand hygiene, maintaining social distancing and getting vaccinated for COVID 19.

Despite the challenges created by COVID 19, most of our members did work. Consequently, our Health and Welfare Fund is doing well. The Ontario Pension Fund is 99% funded on an ongoing basis, according to the recent actuarial evaluation. That is great news for us all!

I wish to take this opportunity to thank our business representatives and staff of DC 46 who worked hard to serve you during this difficult time.

In speaking with our business partners (contractor associations), the prognosis for the rest of this year is optimistic.

It has been a long time since we have been able to attend regular monthly meetings. It is my hope that they can resume this fall (of course dependent upon public health restrictions). As you know, the current collective agreement will expire in April 2022. As such, it is important that we receive feedback from all our working members. This will allow us to gauge member priorities as we begin the bargaining process. PLEASE STAY IN TOUCH AND IF AT ALL POSSIBLE, ATTEND YOUR UPCOMING LOCAL MEETINGS.

I look forward to seeing you soon. Until then, please stay safe.

James was a Metis status Indian, a devoted husband for 45 years, a proud father of 2 and grandfather of 4!


Jim, as everyone called him, was always surrounded by family and friends, where they would always be enjoying bluegrass music and playing along with their guitars. Those were his best days!

COVID-19 PANDEMIC UPDATE

Trades can anticipate a return to normalcy as distancing measures and increasing vaccination rates drive case counts down

As the COVID-19 pandemic moves into its second summer, Ontario has slowly begun to reopen by loosening restrictions and increasing vaccination rates.

The province will be entering Step 3 of the Reopening Ontario plan on July 16. Whereas previously reopening was tied to a colour-coded framework introduced last November, the new plan connects the reopening schedule with vaccination rates, which are:

- Step 1: Under the first phase, 60% of adults had to have received their first dose of a vaccine for restrictions to be loosened. Step 1 kicked in June 11 with patios and non-essential businesses being allowed to reopen. Patios were restricted to four people per table, and non-essential businesses were allowed to operate at 15% capacity, and 25% capacity for essential businesses.
- Step 2: The province moved into the second phase on June 30, ahead of schedule as vaccination rates had hit their target of 70% of adults receiving one dose, and 20% fully vaccinated. This phase allows for six people per table on patios, outdoor social gatherings and organized public events for up to 25 people, essential and other select retail permitted at 50% capacity, and non-essential retail capacity at 25% capacity. Stores in shopping malls opened with capacity limits, as did religious services.
- Step 3: The province moved into the third phase on July 16, ahead of schedule as vaccination rates had hit their target of 70-80% of people receiving their first vaccine dose, and 25% fully vaccinated. Larger indoor and outdoor social gatherings and organized public events will be permitted, and indoor dining resumes.

Public health measures including wearing masks and social distancing continue through all phases of the three-step reopening plan.

How has COVID-19 affected trades, and what have we done to progress through it:

On May 19, the Province lifted its essential workplace limits on construction, a welcome move for tradespeople. Since March, there had been ongoing changes to the job site and to work procedures in order to implement safety measures. Some trades were hit harder than others, particularly in highly populated areas. One thing that has remained constant though, is the ability of skilled trades to respond to these uncertainties quickly and effectively. Here are some examples from IUPAT:

 We launched a COVID rapid testing program that made it easier for members to stay safe by getting tested.

- We shared popup mobile vaccine clinics when available, making it possible for more members to get vaccinated much sooner.
- We offered resources and assistance for members' mental and physical health through a Town Hall organized by IUPAT International.

Skilled trades as a whole have shown that by taking safety precautions early on, implementing comprehensive measures and encouraging ongoing/transparent communication, COVID-19 could be slowed and the curve flattened. Part of the reason construction sites and other workplaces have been so successful at reducing the rate of transmission is by following a number of health and safety practices:

1. Safe Distancing

Social distancing has been one of the most effective ways to reduce the spread of the virus. By maintaining a minimum distance of 6 feet/2 metres apart from another person, workers will be much safer from particle transmission (coughing or sneezing).

2. Maintaining Personal Hygiene

A huge part of transmission is caused by touching your face, nose, eyes and ears. By washing your hands and sanitizing, you will be killing those potentially dangerous germs.

3. On-site Sanitary Stations/Products

As part of additional provincial measures, employers must provide access to first-aid kits, clean washrooms (hot water and soap), sanitizer, cleaning materials, etc. Having access to these products and stations will promote cleanliness and sanitization.

4. Communication

Employers and employees need to be transparent and honest with each other. Communicating current up-to-date information on COVID-19, ongoing safety policies, expectations, roles and responsibilities and procedures on what to do when you get sick will help prevent any outbreaks and slow the spread of the virus.

Some additional measures that construction sites have taken include:

- · Wearing PPE on-site
- Having staggered shift times, including breaks and entrance/exit points
- Limiting the number of workers on-site
- · Holding meetings in large outdoor spaces
- · Responsive and flexible scheduling
- Ongoing tracking and monitoring






THE LIGH HOUSE


Step 3

Confirmation will be sent to your BPA eClaims account when your Direct Deposit has been enabled. Once a claim is processed, you can expect to receive a payment within 48 hours depending on your financial institution. Your eClaims account will notify you when a payment has been made.

Drug Coverage for Members age 65 and Over in Ontario

Members aged sixty-five and over in Ontario are required to claim through the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) first. The Trust Fund will cover the \$100.00 deductible and any drugs eligible under the plan that is not included in the ODB formulary. You should ask your physician to prescribe drugs covered by ODB whenever possible in order to preserve your lifetime maximum under the plan. You may gain access to your ODB benefits by speaking to your pharmacist who will enter your information into the system when you fill a prescription. The ODB program runs annually from August 1 – July 31st the following year. You will receive a letter approximately 3 months prior to your 65th birthday advising you of your upcoming eligibility. Please be sure to advise your pharmacist of your eligibility and request that



your drug be run through the ODB program. Your benefit card will only be required for drugs not included in the program.

Please note the \$100.00 deductible must be submitted separately to the BPA Claims office for processing. You can use your BPA eClaims App or you can submit a claim form for processing.

Other behaviors may also indicate serious risk - especially if the behavior is new, has increased; and/or seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs
- Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly
- Sleeping too little or too much
- Withdrawing or feeling isolated
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge
- Displaying extreme mood swings (SPRC)



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WARNING SIGNS OF SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER

The Mayo Clinic lists these symptoms and signs of substance use disorder: Symptoms Drug addiction symptoms or behaviors include, among others:

- Feeling that you have to use the drug regularly daily or even several times a day
- Having intense urges for the drug that block out any other thoughts
- Over time, needing more of the drug to get the same effect
- Taking larger amounts of the drug over a longer period of time than you intended
- Making certain that you maintain a supply of the drug
- Spending money on the drug, even though you can't afford it
- Not meeting obligations and work responsibilities, or cutting back on social or recreational activities because of drug use

- Continuing to use the drug, even though you know it's causing problems in your life or causing you physical or psychological harm
- Doing things to get the drug that you normally wouldn't do, such as stealing
- Driving or doing other risky activities when you're under the influence of the drug
- Spending a good deal of time getting the drug, using the drug or recovering from the effects of the drug
- Failing in your attempts to stop using the drug
- Experiencing withdrawal symptoms when you attempt to stop taking the drug
