My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Another year has gone by.

Looking back, it was a good year. Working hours are up. However, because of high interest rates and inflation, there is a slowing in sales in the residential sector, which could trigger a slowing in construction in the next year.

On a positive note, District Council 46 continues to grow. A new local, Local 2023—Automatic Door Technicians, has been formed. I attended one of their monthly meetings and it was a pleasure to see the members' enthusiasm.


Unfortunately, as it becomes colder and people move to indoor activities, COVID 19 is starting to spike again. Please protect yourselves, your families and coworkers.

### The Walnut Foundation

On Saturday September 30, 2023, DC46, The Walnut Foundation, TAIBU Community Health Centre and Princess Margaret Hospital joined together to put on a Health Fair in Scarborough to bring awareness for prostate cancer. They offered free Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) test to DC 46 members, their families, and members of the community.

Although DC 46 benefits cover the cost of the PSA test, the health fair was to encourage everyone to be proactive with their health, and to talk to their doctor about this disease. Although, one in eight men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer, if caught early, can be treated and can save your life.

The Walnut Foundation is a non-profit volunteer base organization that offers support for those diagnosed with prostate cancer.

### DC 46 Humanitarian House Build

When DC 46 Political Director Ivan Dawns read about 77 year old single father Radcliffe Carr who resides in Chapleton, Jamaica, Brother Ivan knew he had to help a fellow Brother out. Radcliffe who lives in the parish of Clarendon, Jamaica, just 40 minutes from his own hometown, lives with his daughter Joda, and her eight month old granddaughter Azaria. Joda, who is medically not well, and who does not have support of Azaria's father, struggle to provide food and shelter for their family.

The family lives in a one bedroom structure without a kitchen and bathroom. The floor bards are rotten and falling apart. The ceiling is infested with termites, and the roof leaks when it rains. Meals are prepared and cooked on a hotplate. The three of them have been living in the one bedroom structure without furniture. Ivan decided that as a father himself, he want to provide Joda with the safety and stability to raise her child.

He reached out to union and community partners for their help. Brother Ivan needed to raise \$21,000 Canadian dollars to build them a house. Apart from making a personal donation, Brother Dawns with a team of 14 other tradesmen paid their own airfare and hotel and flew to Jamaica to build this family a house. After arriving in Jamaica, Ivan went from the airport to see Radcliffe to let him know that they are on the island and would be working on the house the next day. Radcliffe put one of his arms around Ivan and raised his other hand to the heaven, and thanked the lord for sending angels to help him in his time of needs. The team built the Carr family a small two bedroom home, with a kitchen, dining room and a washroom.

After the build, the keys were handed over to the family, and Brother Ivan donated a bag with clothes and toys for little Azaria. The team of volunteers from Canada donated their tools to the Jamaican tradesmen who helped them build this home. Also, in attendance, were Members of Parliament for the area, Robert Morgan and City Councillor, Hershell Brown.

Radcliffe was formerly incarcerated and struggles to hold down a job. When hired, as soon as, they found out that he has a record he would lose the job. He would take job as a dishwasher, casual labourer, among other informal work.

We at DC 46 want to wish the family all the best in their new home.

### The Walnut Foundation's 9th Annual Walkathon

On Saturday June 3rd, IUPAT DC46 teamed up with The Walnut Foundation for a 10 km walkathon to bring awareness to prostate cancer and men's health. Prostate cancer is the most common form of cancer in men and one in eight men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer.

In attendance were representatives from the three levels of government and as well as our Toronto Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Eileen de Villa. They all praised DC46 for joining the conversation on prostate cancer and for encouraging members to be proactive and to take their health seriously. Prostate cancer if caught early can be cured. Dr. de Villa reminded us that it is recommended to start our prostate cancer screening by PSA blood test or by digital examination at the age of 50, and if you are from the high risk group (by race, family history, etc.) its recommended to start screening at the age of 40.

Honorary Chair and one of the organizers of this walkathon, DC46 Political Director Ivan Dawns, told the large crowd of his personal experience with this disease. He said when he was 16 years of age his grandfather died from prostate cancer and he also lost an uncle to the disease three years ago, and just last year he attended four of his members' funerals that died from this disease. Brother Dawns said that the most common thing he heard at the funeral was, "my husband didn't have to die, if he had gone to get tested he would still be here". Brother Dawns stressed that as a member of the Building Trades Union and with more than 90 percent of our members being men, it is our responsibility to educate them on the dangers of not getting tested. "We believe in Health and Safety" he said, "we want our members to go to work and come home to their families safe, and to live a long and healthy life".

The campaign raised over \$156,000 with all proceeds going towards prostate cancer research, support for men living with prostate cancer, support for families of someone that has died from the disease, and an annual scholarship in the form of an endowment for a student to study oncology or urology at the University of Toronto.

The Walnut Foundation is a non-profit organization that gives one on one support for men living with prostate cancer, and also works with Princess Margaret Hospital for prostate cancer research. All members of the board are prostate cancer survivors. They are all volunteers, so 100 percent of the funds raised goes towards this cause.





In Canada, each province provides a medical plan that covers hospital confinement, medical services, ambulance services, and other health practitioners. Provincial medical plans will typically make a payment towards medical expenses when outside of your province or country of residence, however, this payment can often be considerably less than the actual cost.

This benefit helps to cover expenses that would otherwise have to be paid out of pocket to allow peace of mind while travelling. It is important to note that such expenses are covered provided that they were unexpected and of an emergency nature.

- Eligible for those up to age 99
- Stability clause for any sickness, injury or medical condition that was not stable in the 180 days prior to departure date for those over age 85
- No pre-existing condition or stability clause for those under age 85

- Coverage for per-trip maximum of \$5 million up to age 75 and \$1 million for age 75 and over


### Step 3

Confirmation will be sent to your BPA eClaims account when your Direct Deposit has been enabled. Once a claim is processed, you can expect to receive a payment within 48 hours depending on your financial institution. Your eClaims account will notify you when a payment has been made.

Important – You must have a registered BPA eClaims account to have your claims reimbursed via EFT. Don't delay – sign up today! Feel free to contact our office at iupat@bpagroup.com or 416-636-4700 if you require assistance.

### **Drug Coverage for Members age 65** and Over in Ontario

Members aged sixty-five and over in Ontario are required to claim through the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) first. The Trust Fund will cover the \$100.00 deductible and any drugs eligible under the plan that is not included in the ODB formulary. You should ask your physician to prescribe drugs covered by ODB whenever possible in order to preserve your lifetime maximum under the plan. You may gain access to your ODB benefits by speaking to your pharmacist who will enter your information into the system when you fill a prescription. The ODB program runs annually from August 1 – July 31st the following year. You will receive a letter approximately 3 months prior to your 65th birthday advising you of your upcoming eligibility. Please be sure to advise your pharmacist of your eligibility and request that



your drug be run through the ODB program. Your benefit card will only be required for drugs not included in the program.

Please note the \$100.00 deductible must be submitted separately to the BPA Claims office for processing. You can use your BPA eClaims App or you can submit a claim form for processing.

- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.


Other behaviors may also indicate serious risk - especially if the behavior is new, has increased; and/or seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.



### WARNING SIGNS OF SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER

The Mayo Clinic lists these symptoms and signs of substance use disorder: Symptoms Drug addiction symptoms or behaviors include, among others:

- Feeling that you have to use the drug regularly daily or even several times a day
- Having intense urges for the drug that block out any other thoughts
- Over time, needing more of the drug to get the same effect
- Taking larger amounts of the drug over a longer period of time than you intended
- Making certain that you maintain a supply of the drug
- Spending money on the drug, even though you can't afford it
- Not meeting obligations and work responsibilities, or cutting back on social or recreational activities because of drug use

- Continuing to use the drug, even though you know it's causing problems in your life or causing you physical or psychological harm
- Doing things to get the drug that you normally wouldn't do, such as stealing
- Driving or doing other risky activities when you're under the influence of the drug
- Spending a good deal of time getting the drug, using the drug or recovering from the effects of the drug
- Failing in your attempts to stop using the drug
- Experiencing withdrawal symptoms when you attempt to stop taking the drug
